## Ben Hunter: A Literacy Volunteer

Learning to speak English can be quite a daunting experience for those moving to the U.S. To help, the Literacy Volunteers of the Tarrytowns provides volunteer tutors to provide a bridge so students can learn to better communicate in English-speaking situations such as shopping, working, medical visits, emergencies and child advocacy. This allows some to continue learning in more formal classroom settings. This year, 41 tutoring pairs have been working through LVT at the Warner Library or on Zoom, providing 1,248 tutoring hours. The goal is for volunteers to tutor 4 hours a week. The organization was founded in 1974.

Ben Hunter, a Manor resident since 1985, began his volunteer work with LVT in 2011 and became vice president in 2020. He retired from the finance department at McKinsey in 2014 and welcomed the chance to get more involved locally.

"Our learners are adults with families and are working hard in their jobs," Hunter said. "They want to learn and it is very rewarding to help them. As a native speaker, we have a wonderful skill. With some training, we can share this skill, and it can really help people in a meaningful way."



The tutors don't need to be former teachers or English majors. Anyone who has helped a child with math or history homework, for example, has experienced tutoring. The tutors are trained and matched with a student. The idea, Hunter said, is to guide the learners to speak more confidently and to improve their grammar skills and vocabulary.

His first student was a local Korean business owner who wanted to speak better and more confidently with his customers. His next student is a carpet installer from Ecuador. He said they progressed to reading children's books to help him to also learn to read English. And his student now enjoys reading the books to his young sons.

An important aspect of the partnership, said Hunter, is to connect with one's student by finding topics of interest to talk about such as family, work and local traditions.
