And the PMIA heartily thanks departing board members Ken Anderson, Tim Murphy and Jennifer Waltman, for their numerous contributions to the PMIA.


We appreciate, as well, the many who volunteered to help in our ongoing efforts, projects and events and look forward to your contributions.
